


Brighton Toy & Model Museum





⇨ NEWHAVEN HARBOUR

Seaford, the terminus station which takes you right into the heart of the town, where you will find shops, a great little museum, beach and stunning walks to the Seven Sisters and Seaford Head. Seaford is large town with approximately 27,000 residents and a long and prosperous history. In the Middle Ages it was a very successful port. The hamlet itself which is a mile from the station is home to what is considered to be the oldest church in the county, the Saxon church of St Andrew.


